Addendum: Six Theses about Emancipatory theory.

- 1. Fundamental change is possible
- 2. Agents for change come from within the game
- 3. Change comes through struggle
- 4. **Punchline**: opppressed people can transform the conditions of their own oppression through struggle.

BUT

- 5. **Constraints**: They do so under constraints which can thwart their efforts
- 6. **Knowledge**: Therefore: *to transform the world we must understand and transform the constraints* themselves.
